KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

U.S. Sen. Jack Reed (D-R.I.)

Jack Reed is Rhode Island's senior U.S. senator and serves as chairman of both the Senate Armed Services Committee and the Appropriations Subcommittee on Legislative Branch. He also serves on the Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs Committee and is an ex-officio member of the Select Committee on Intelligence. Sen. Reed was part of the bipartisan working group that wrote the CARES Act and successfully led efforts to create the \$150 billion Coronavirus Relief Fund to help states combat COVID-19. TIME magazine called Reed "a serious, intellectually honest veteran and an expert on defense issues in the Senate," and The New York Times described him as "a quiet deal-maker respected by colleagues in both parties." Sen. Reed graduated from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point (BS, '71); the John F. Kennedy School of Government (MPP, '73); and Harvard Law School (JD, '81).



ADM Harry Harris, USN (Ret.)



In June 2018, Harry Harris retired from the U.S. Navy as a four-star admiral in charge of all military operations for more than half of the world's geography. That same month, he was sworn in as the U.S. ambassador to the Republic of Korea. He is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. As a diplomat, he led efforts in renegotiating the U.S.-Republic of Korea Special Measures Agreement and promoted American interests in South Korea. The highest ranking Asian-American in the history of the U.S. Navy, Harris took over command of U.S. Pacific Command (USPACOM) in 2015. He previously served as representative of the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff to Secretaries of State Hillary Clinton and John Kerry and commander of the U.S.

Pacific Fleet. A naval flight officer, he served in every geographic combatant region and participated in several major operations, including Desert Shield/Storm, Enduring Freedom, Iraqi Freedom, and Odyssey Dawn.

Chris Inglis

Chris Inglis is serving as the first national cyber director to President Joe Biden, a post established by the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2021. He is principal advisor to the president on cybersecurity policy and strategy and cybersecurity engagement with industry and international stakeholders. Inglis retired from the Department of Defense in 2014 after over 41 years of federal service, including 28 years at the National Security Agency where he served in various roles and ultimately as its deputy director. He is a retired Air National Guard brigadier general, and a U.S. Air Force Academy graduate. Inglis' military career includes over 30 years in the U.S. Air Force and Air National Guard. He served as a U.S. Naval Academy Looker Distinguished Visiting Professor for cyber studies and as a commissioner on the U.S. Cyberspace Solarium Commission. Inglis also served as a member of the Department of Defense Science Board and as a National Intelligence University trustee until early 2021.

RADM Shoshana Chatfield



Rear Adm. Shoshana Chatfield was appointed as the 57th president of the U.S. Naval War College (USNWC) in August 2019. The first woman to lead the U.S. Navy's premier higher education institution, RADM Chatfield is a career naval helicopter pilot. She was the 20th commanding officer of Helicopter Combat Support Squadron (HC)-5. Upon its disestablishment, she became the first commanding officer of Helicopter Sea Combat (HSC)-25, the Island Knights. She subsequently commanded a joint provincial reconstruction team in Farah Province, Afghanistan, in 2008 and was type wing commander of HSC Wing, U.S. Pacific Fleet, from 2011-2013. RADM Chatfield commanded Joint Region Marianas from January 2017 to August 2019. She served as assistant professor

of political science at the United States Air Force Academy from 2001-2004 and holds a doctorate in education from the University of San Diego.

Philip M. Bilden

Naval War College Foundation Board of Trustees Chairman Philip M. Bilden has served as a Trustee since 2012. He is Founder and Managing Partner of Shield Capital, a venture capital firm investing in technology companies supporting U.S. national security customers. He previously co-founded global private equity firm HarbourVest Partners, establishing the Asia Pacific business and residing in Hong Kong until retiring after 25 years. He served for 10 years as a U.S. Army Reserve military intelligence officer. He previously served on the Chief of Naval Operations Executive Panel and the Board of Directors of Huntington Ingalls Industries (NYSE: HII), the largest shipbuilder to the US Navy.



MODERATORS

ADM Scott Swift, USN (Ret.)

Retired Adm. Scott Swift served in the U.S. Navy for more than 40 years, completing his uniformed career as the 35th Commander of U.S. Pacific Fleet in 2018. He rose from his commission through the Aviation Reserve Officer Candidate program to become a Navy light attack and strike fighter pilot. He commanded at all levels, including F/A-18 weapons school, aircraft carrier-based squadrons, Carrier AirWing, Carrier Strike Group and the U.S. Seventh Fleet forward deployed to Japan. He participated in combat Operations Praying Mantis, Southern Watch, Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom. He is the founder of The Swift Group LLC, a management/leadership/security consulting firm. ADM Swift is a Senior Fellow at the Center for Naval Analysis, a Research Affiliate at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and an Adjunct Professor at the U.S. Naval War College. He was previously a Robert E. Wilhelm Fellow at MIT Center for International Studies.



Fran Moore

After joining the Central Intelligence Agency in 1983, Fran Moore served for 12 years as an analyst on East Asia before moving into leadership roles. She retired in 2015 as director of intelligence (now analysis). Moore is now president of FPM Consulting, LLC. She is also the strategic intelligence advisor to the Analysis and Resilience Center, where she helps guide decision

making by national infrastructure operators and the U.S. government to protect critical systems from attack.

Kevin Allison

As vice president for Europe & Eurasia and technology policy at Albright Stonebridge Group (ASG), Kevin Allison helps the world's leading companies and investors understand how political and regulatory trends influence 5G networks, artificial intelligence, semiconductors, global technology supply chains, and cross-border data flows. He was director and deputy head of the Eurasia Group's geo-technology practice. Previously, he was a correspondent and a columnist at the Financial Times and Thomson Reuters, where he covered the tech industry, energy sector, and capital markets from London, New York, and Silicon Valley. Allison also worked for UBS Investment Bank.



Allison was a Fulbright Scholar in Austria from 2000-2001, and a journalism fellow in complex systems science at the Santa Fe Institute. His work has appeared across major U.S. and global news, radio, and television outlets.

Andrew Boyd

Andrew Boyd is currently serving as the director of the Center for Cyber Intelligence at the Central Intelligence Agency. The majority of Boyd's career has been spent collaborating closely with partners from across all directorates, mission centers, and the intelligence community. He earned a B.S. in history from the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1993 and served on active duty as an intelligence officer in the USAF from 1993-1998. He also earned an M.A. in International Relations from Catholic University in 1997, and a M.S. in Strategic Policy from the National War College in 2013.

Todd C. Conklin

As counselor to Deputy Treasury Secretary Adewale "Wally" Adeyemo, Todd Conklin leads Treasury's cyber portfolio. He also serves as deputy assistant secretary for the Office of Cybersecurity and Critical Infrastructure Protection. Conklin designed and implemented Treasury's counter-ransomware strategy to update crypto industry guidance and target sanctions actions. He previously served as chief information officer for intelligence platforms and innovation, and chief data officer for the Office of Terrorism and Financial Intelligence (TFI). He led cybersecurity and data modernization efforts across Treasury's critical national security assets and worked to develop a secure hybrid cloud environment and centralized data analytics platform for sanctions and anti-money laundering data. Conklin established and chaired the TFI Data Governance Board. He has private sector experience working at Exxon Mobil Corporation and has worked for the National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency and the U.S. Secret Service.



John K. Culver

In his 35 years at the Central Intelligence Agency, John K. Culver was a leading analyst of East Asian affairs and an expert on the Chinese military. He retired in 2020 as a senior intelligence officer. As a national intelligence officer for East Asia, Culver drove the intelligence community's support to top policymakers and managed extensive relationships inside and outside government. He produced a large body of analysis and mentored widely on analytic tradecraft. He also represented the intelligence community to senior U.S. policy, military, academic, private-sector and foreign-government audiences. He is a senior fellow with the Atlantic Council's Global China Hub.



Chris C. Demchak, Ph.D.

Chris C. Demchak is the RDML Grace M. Hopper Professor of Cyber Security and a member of the Cyber and Innovation Policy Institute at the U.S. Naval War College (USNWC). Her research and publications take a systemic approach to cyberspace as an emerging complex, insecure “substrate” layered throughout digital societies. As a military officer, she studied Lisp, the second-oldest high-level programming language after Fortran. She retired from the U.S. Army as a lieutenant colonel.

Elaine K. Dezenski

Elaine K. Dezenski is senior director and head of the Center on Economic and Financial Power at the Foundation for Defense of Democracies. She is a globally recognized expert and thought leader on geopolitical risk, supply chain security, anti-corruption, and national security. From 2010 to 2015, she served as senior director at the World Economic Forum, where she led the Partnering Against Corruption Initiative and launched the Global Risk Response Network, a global platform designed to address a broad range of macro-level risks to business and society. In 2015, she launched LumiRisk LCC, a risk advisory practice. She recently served on the newly formed Chairman's Council on China Competition at the Export-Import Bank of the United States. She has also served as a senior fellow at the Jackson Institute for Global Affairs at Yale University and as a lecturer in Yale's Program on Ethics, Politics, and Economics.



Gerard DiPippo

Gerard DiPippo is a senior fellow with the Economics Program at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS). He joined CSIS after nearly 11 years in the U.S. intelligence community. From 2018 to 2021, Gerard was a deputy national intelligence officer for economic issues at the National Intelligence Council, where he led economic analysis of East Asia. He also was a senior economic analyst at the Central Intelligence Agency, focused on East Asia, South Asia, and global economic issues.

Nikolas K. Gvosdev, D.Phil.

Nikolas K. Gvosdev is a professor of national security affairs at the U.S. Naval War College (USNWC). He holds a non-residential fellowship with the Foreign Policy Research Institute where he serves as editor of the journal of world affairs “Orbis.” He co-hosts the “Doorstep” podcast as a fellow for the Carnegie Council for Ethics in International Affairs. He is a member of Loisch Group, a collaboration between the Munich Security Conference and the Marshall Center, to enhance U.S. and Germany’s security partnership. He is a contributing editor for The National Interest. He has taught at Baylor, Georgetown, George Washington, Harvard Extension and Brown universities. From 2016-20, he held the USNWC Captain Jerome E. Levy Chair in economic geography and national security.



James R. Holmes, Ph.D.

James R. Holmes holds the J. C. Wylie Chair of Maritime Strategy at the U.S. Naval War College (USNWC) and previously served on the faculty of the University of Georgia School of Public and International Affairs. A former U.S. Navy surface-warfare officer and combat veteran of the first Gulf War, he served as a weapons and engineering officer on the battleship Wisconsin, engineering and firefighting instructor at the Surface Warfare Officers School Command, and military professor of strategy at the USNWC. His most recent books are “Habits of Highly Effective Maritime Strategists,” and “A Brief Guide to Maritime Strategy.” He and Toshi Yoshihara are co-authors of “Red Star over the Pacific.” His next book, “A Brief Guide to Joint Sea Power,” is under contract for 2023.



Maj Gen Earl Matthews, USAF (Ret.)

Maj Gen Earl Matthews, USAF (Ret.), is vice president of strategy at Mandiant, a cybersecurity firm based in Reston, Virginia. A certified information systems security professional, he has three decades of experience in cyber, IT and space operations, including serving as director of cyberspace operations and chief information security officer for the U.S. Air Force. Matthews oversaw a multi-billion-dollar cyber enterprise, leading a workforce of 76,000 military, civilian and contractor personnel, while supporting 850,000 customers and conducting cyber operations worldwide. He also was chief information officer of the U.S. Transportation Command, the world’s largest multi-module logistics organization, and commanded Ramstein Air Base in Germany, the Air Force’s largest overseas installation. Senior leadership positions have included serving as chief strategy officer for startup Verodin, Inc., leading to its acquisition by FireEye/Mandiant in 2019 and vice president and general manager of U.S. public sector for enterprise security solutions at HP/HPE/DXC Technology. Matthews is an advisor to the Department of Defense Science Board.



Frank L. Miller, Jr.

As vice president of intelligence integration and director of the Center for Intelligence Research and Analysis (CIRA) at SOS International subsidiary Exovera, Frank L. Miller, Jr. leads business planning, talent acquisition, capability development, and senior client management as well as industry engagement and strategic partnerships. During his 42 years in federal service, he served as director of the Office of Partner Engagement, overseeing more than 120 foreign defense attachés posted to Washington, D.C. As an Army officer, he held a series of Asia-focused assignments and was hand-selected to become the second defense attaché to Vietnam. He also completed a tour as the

Army attache in Beijing, China and served as the sole uniformed member of the U.S. Delegation to the Six Party Talks on denuclearizing North Korea.

Chris Painter

Chris Painter prosecuted some of the country’s most high-profile cybercrime cases before becoming a senior official at the Department of Justice, FBI, National Security Council and the State Department. He coordinated and led U.S. diplomatic efforts to advance an open, secure and reliable internet and information infrastructure, including establishing the Office of the Coordinator for Cyber Issues, the first office dedicated to advancing cyber diplomacy. He served in the White House as senior director for cyber policy in the National Security Council. He was a senior member of the team that conducted the President’s Cyberspace Policy Review in 2009 and subsequently helped create and structure a new directorate in the National Security Council for these issues. As a federal prosecutor, he prosecuted notorious hacker Kevin Mitnick, one of the first wide-spread distributed denial of service attacks and the first internet stock manipulation cases. Painter chaired the G8 (and then G7) High-Tech Crime Group for over 10 years. He is currently president of the Global Forum on Cyber Expertise Foundation.



The Hon. Bing West

Military historian Bing West served as dean of research at the U.S. Naval War College from 1976 to 1980 before departing for the Pentagon to become assistant secretary of defense for international security affairs in the Reagan Administration. A Marine infantry officer in Vietnam, he has written a dozen books chronicling the front lines of our wars in Vietnam, Iraq and Afghanistan. His books include several national bestsellers, including his 2019 collaboration with Marine General Jim Mattis, “Call Sign Chaos: Learning to Lead.”
