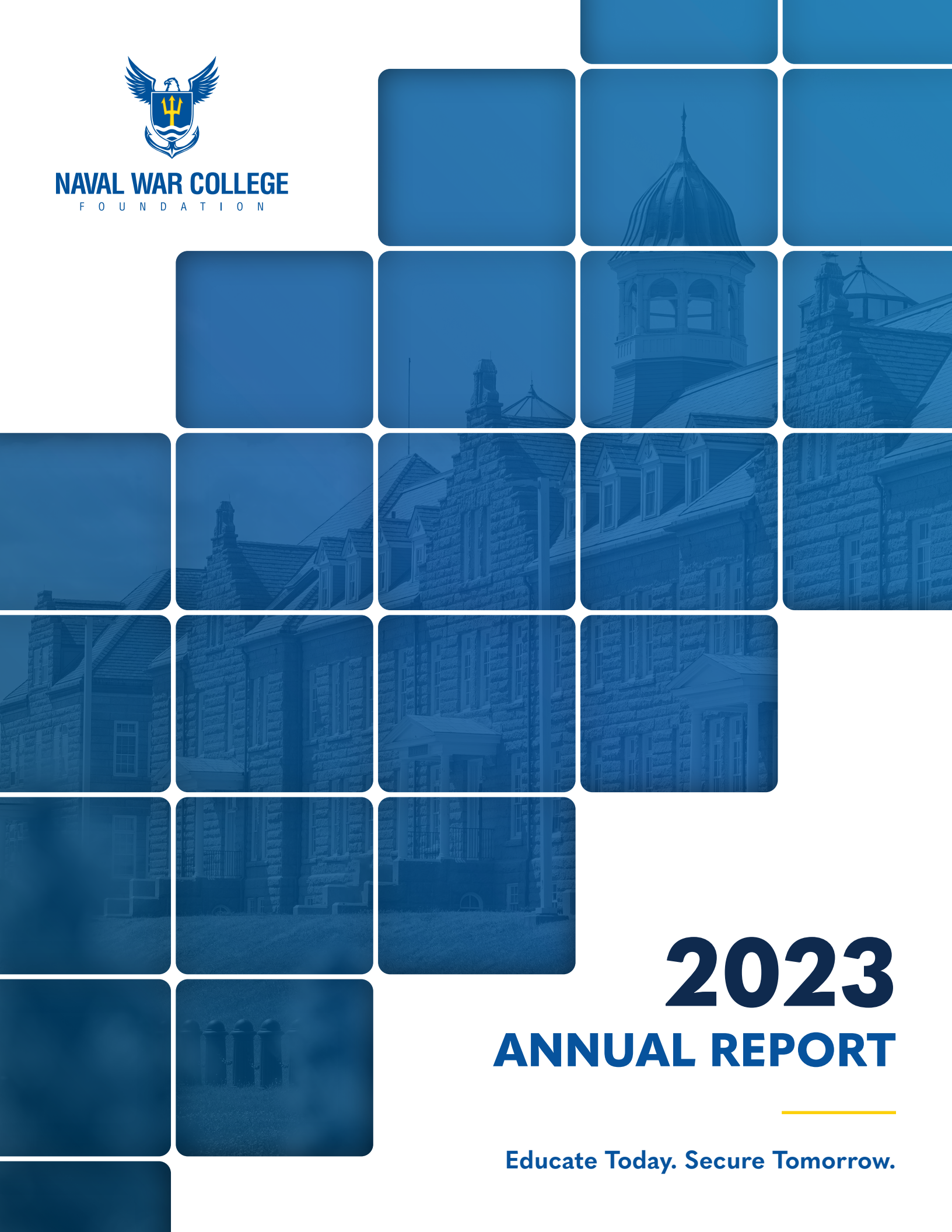

A MESSAGE FROM LEADERSHIP



2023 brought many exciting changes for the Naval War College Foundation (NWCFF) and U.S. Naval War College (USNWC). This year's tremendous success would not have been possible without the unwavering support and valued contributions of our esteemed Board of Trustees, the relentless commitment of our staff, and the unparalleled generosity of our wonderful members, sponsors, and friends. Because of you, the NWCFF is able to provide meaningful support to the USNWC, sustaining this pillar of national security leadership development in an ever-changing threat environment.

This year marked exponential growth in capital—both financial and personnel. The Foundation received a historic seven-figure gift from an anonymous donor in memory of Trustee Emeritus Richard M. Rosenberg, who passed away in March 2023. This endowment will support the Richard M. Rosenberg Deterrence Studies Institute (RDSI) and related initiatives at the USNWC. You can read more about the Foundation's solid financial position in the next section. In 2023, we added new full-time staff members to the Foundation team across development, operations, and administration. As we enter the third year of our strategic plan, we continue to grow our staff and add depth to our bench in our Board leadership team. In 2023, the Honorable Ronald K. Machtley, J. Ronald Terwilliger, the Honorable Erik Bethel, and Gregory J. Annick were appointed for their first terms as Trustees, and we welcomed returning Trustees Nancy Cushing Evans and Philip Dunmire. We also saw the transition of Philip M. Bilden to Chairman Emeritus and VADM Allen G. Myers, USN (Ret.) to Trustee Emeritus at our June 2023 Board of Trustees meeting. Later in the year, we were honored to add Thomas Callender as a Regional Director for the Washington, DC, area. The winds of change also welcomed the 58th President of the USNWC, RADM Peter A. Garvin, USN, in June 2023. He relieved now-VADM Shoshana S. Chatfield, USN, who has been assigned as U.S. Military Representative to the NATO Military Committee. During his first six months as President, RADM Garvin hosted the leaders of nearly 100 international navies and coast guards during the CNO's 25th International Seapower Symposium here in Newport.





With the USNWC President and Provost, the Foundation leadership and staff continue to work in support of our four strategic pillars:

- Elevate and expand our partnership with the USNWC and senior Navy leadership;
- Promote and advance USNWC impact on national security;
- Provide resources to the USNWC to maintain its competitive advantage in a challenging national security environment; and
- Attract alumni to join the NWCF by enhancing and enriching programs and activities that appeal to them. 2023 marked the forging of partnerships, both with the College and other esteemed institutions around the country. These were most evident when members and friends had the opportunity to hear the insights of national security thought leaders at NWCF events, including:
 - Sustaining U.S. Maritime Dominance in an Era of Strategic Competition, in partnership with the U.S. Naval Academy Alumni Association & Foundation in Palm Beach, FL;
 - U.S. and China Relations: Tension in the Indo-Pacific Region, in partnership with the Silicon Valley Defense Group, Mountain View, CA;
 - Exploring Our Maritime Strategies, co-hosted with the USNWC's Center on Irregular Warfare and Armed Groups, Middletown, RI; and
 - America's Future Fleet: Maintaining Peace and Deterring China, the second annual symposium in partnership with the Center for Maritime Strategy, Arlington, VA.

As the NWCF continues to expand awareness of the USNWC across the country, we are eternally grateful for your continued patriotic support. You enable the USNWC to provide the highest-quality education to leaders from America and our partners and allies around the world. As we see continued conflict with the Israel-Hamas and Russia-Ukraine Wars and persistent challenges from China, the USNWC provides not just a critical education to its students but essential information to our Nation's decision-makers.

As you will read in the pages ahead, your investment in the USNWC positively impacted a variety of initiatives across campus that have a worldwide impact. On behalf of the Foundation and the College we serve, thank you for strengthening us and ensuring the USNWC is equipped to produce the leaders our future world needs.

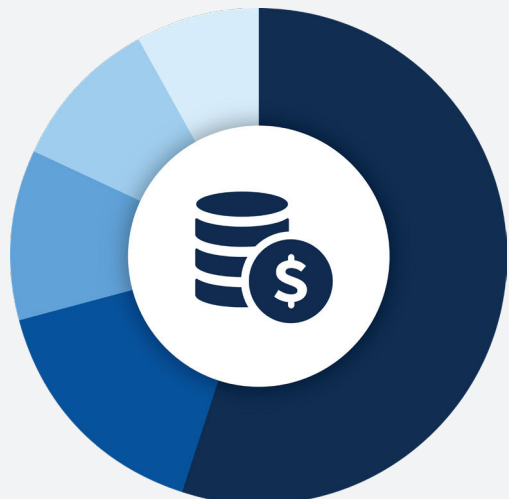
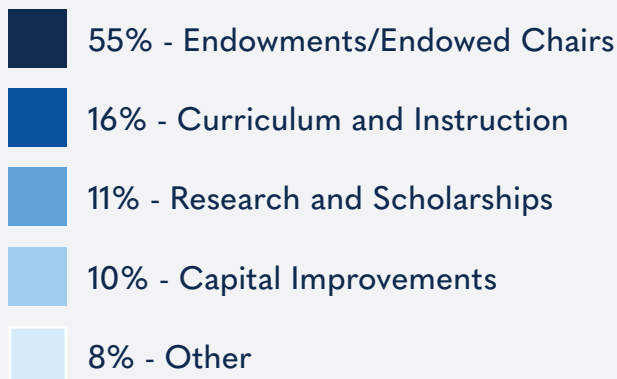
WHO ARE OUR DONORS?

GIFT INVESTMENT CATEGORIES

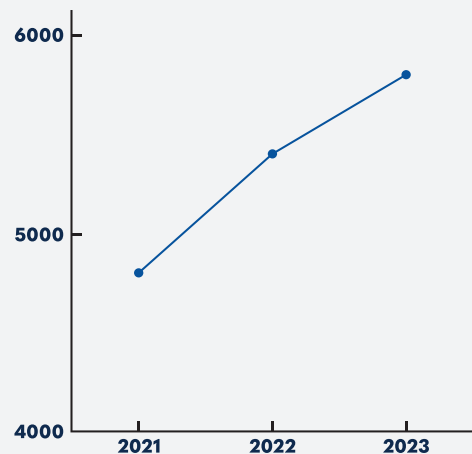
Endowments, curriculum and instruction, and research and scholarships were the top-funded areas in 2023.

OPPORTUNITIES IN ACTION

U.S. NAVAL WAR COLLEGE'S UNFUNDED PRIORITIES

The U.S. Navy and the President of the U.S. Naval War College (USNWC) have identified several priorities that are not included in the Pentagon budget. With the support of our generous members, the Naval War College Foundation (NWCFF) continues to fund the development of these important initiatives and programs:



The Admiral's Fund for Innovation and Experimentation

The Admiral's Fund for Innovation and Experimentation will provide the President of the USNWC the resources critical to meeting the mandate of today's, and tomorrow's, Navy and Joint force to prevail in the cognitive domain while supporting the enrichment of its teaching, research, and outreach efforts.



Strategic Deterrence Initiative

The robust Cold War understanding of the nuclear balance and its implications for deterrence and war fighting has atrophied considerably. These changes warrant a major investment of time and resources to engage in focused research on strategic deterrence from the conventional, through high-conventional and cross-domain, to the full nuclear spectrum. The Rosenberg Deterrence Studies Institute (RDSI) will keep the College on the cutting edge of research, education, and fleet support on deterrence and war fighting in these domains.

ADDITIONAL KEY COLLEGE PRIORITIES

Arctic Studies Chair

The chair will advance the teaching and research of maritime-security issues and address critical American national-security interests in the Arctic region.

Alumni Relations Support

Annual funding supports the Regional Alumni Symposium and domestic alumni engagement.

International Programs Support

The U.S. Navy's maritime partnerships are heavily dependent on the bonds of trust built between our American and international alumni who serve at the highest levels of command in their respective services. Funds support social programs, family travel, and team building.

➤ Endowment of the Swanee Hunt Chair for Women, Peace, and Security

With the June 2020 signing of DoD's WPS Strategic Framework and Implementation Plan, which itself supports the United States Strategy on Women, Peace, and Security, the College seeks to increase its efforts toward integrating WPS concepts and principles into joint professional military education (JPME) programs and activities at the USNWC. The WPS Endowed Chair will facilitate the integration of DoD WPS policy into JPME in a variety of ways, including the following: contributing to activities designed to inform, train, and educate the USNWC community about WPS efforts and objectives; conducting research on topics of relevance and collaborating with other government, nongovernment, and academic organizations.

➤ Humanitarian-Response Program

The program's mission is to partner and network with leading universities and humanitarian organizations to advance civil-military coordination during complex emergencies and natural disasters, and to improve the U.S. Navy's effectiveness in conducting humanitarian-assistance and disaster-response operations through innovative education, research, and simulation activities.

➤ The Center for Ethical Leadership

The Center will take a multidisciplinary and holistic approach toward ethical leadership and cognitive growth. Drawing on the fields of sociology, artificial intelligence, psychology, organizational behavior, ethics, and philosophy, the Center will be a place of innovative research and a hub for the exchange of ideas regarding ethical leader development.

➤ Capital Projects for Historic Renovation and Improvements

These include the Mahan Hall renovation, Schonland and Hooper Halls demolition, McCarty Little Hall (MLH) auditorium improvements, and audio/visual upgrades.

Endowment of the Chair in Emerging Technology and International Law

The chaired professor would teach and promote the progressive development of international law affecting U.S. and partner-nation forces in advanced-technology warfare, which is being formed by other states, nongovernmental organizations, and unfriendly scholars without optimal contribution by the USNWC.

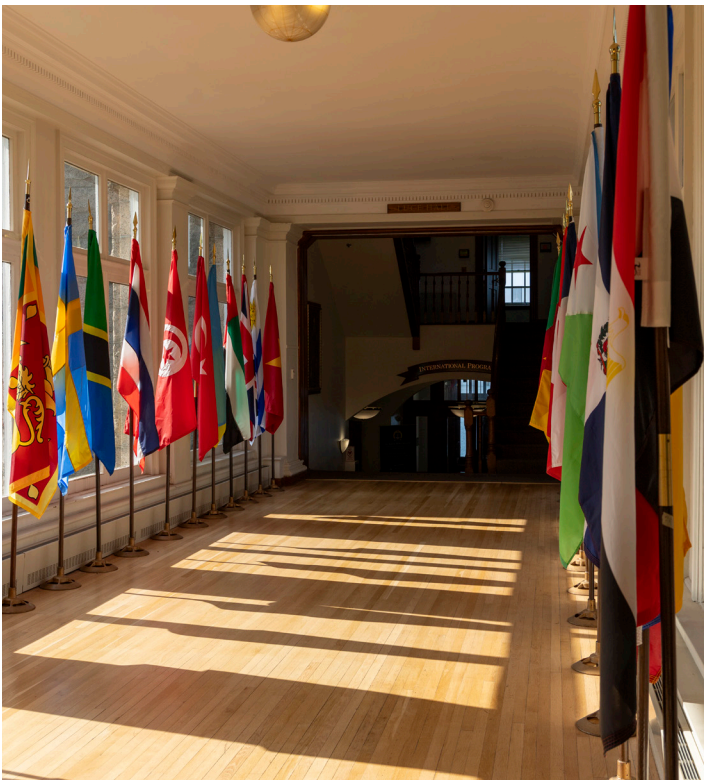
Curriculum and Instruction

Lieutenant Michael P. Murphy Counterterrorism Prize

This award is named in memory of Lieutenant Michael P. Murphy, a U.S. Navy SEAL officer who received the U.S. military’s highest honor, the Medal of Honor. Lt. Murphy received the honor for his heroic actions on June 28, 2005, in Afghanistan, where he gave his life in defense of our great Nation.

Vice Admiral James H. Doyle, Jr., Military Operations and International Law Prize

Robert E. Batemans’ International Prize Essay Award

This award is funded by the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Bateman and given to a NCC student for submitting the best essay on a topic relating to force planning or strategic issues of maritime interest.

Captain Pradeep Singh Sethi, Indian Navy, “Forming a Combined Maritime Task Force under the Quad in the Indo-Pacific Region.”

Admiral Richard G. Colbert Memorial Prize

This prize is presented to a student for the best essay addressing strategic, military, or political aspects of the U.S. Navy’s roles or missions.

CDR Charles Gough, JAGC, CNW, “Why the U.S. Needs to Lead in Lethal Autonomous Weapon Systems Development”

Zimmerman-Gray Essay Award

Provided through the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Gilson Gray, this prize is named for their fathers, Commander Donald Zimmerman, United States Navy, and Commander Gilson B. Gray, Jr., United States Navy. Both men were career naval aviators who saw combat duty during World War II.

Asia-Pacific Studies Prize

The Asia-Pacific Studies Prize for the best paper related to the region comprising the maritime and continental territory from South and Central Asia to the Pacific Rim.

Brian M. Sperlongano, Naval Sea Systems Command, CNCS, “Speak Softly and Carry a Big Stick: Preventing US-China Conflict Over Taiwan”

McGinnis Family Award for Outstanding Performance in Nonresident Seminar Education

This award was presented at the USNWC graduation by NWCFC Chairman of the Board, Daniel E. Holland III, to Lt Timothy J. Cadigan III, USN, of the CDE. Professor Ronald J. Oard accepted the award on Lt Cadigan's behalf.



Faculty Awards

In 2023, the NWCFC supported the College's first-ever Faculty Awards Dinner at the Hotel Viking in Newport, RI. Through the generosity of an anonymous donor, the NWCFC established the Naval War College Faculty Excellence Fund, which can be used to support various faculty events and activities, including, but not limited to, awards recognizing excellence in teaching, training, professional development, publishing, service, scholarship, innovative curriculum and/or course development, simulations and/or war gaming.

The 2023 recipients were John H. Maurer, Ph.D., Strategy and Policy Department; Samuel Helfont, Ph.D., Assistant Professor, College of Distance Education; and Jessica Blankshain, Ph.D., Associate Professor, National Security Affairs Department.

Hosting Thought Leadership on Campus



Newport Arctic Scholars Initiative Seminar January 24-26

The Newport Arctic Scholars Initiative (NASI) held its opening seminar on the USNWC campus, bringing together naval officers and scholars from Arctic nations. Twenty five sailors and scholars from Canada, Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway, Sweden, the United States, France, the United Kingdom, and Japan (as an observer) convened to explore opportunities to strengthen cooperation between international navies and coast guards in the Arctic maritime region. The Honorable Kenneth J. Braithwaite, 77th Secretary of the Navy, and Vice Admiral Daniel Dwyer, then Commander, Second Fleet/Commander, Joint Forces Command Norfolk provided keynote remarks.

The Inaugural Forum at Newport | April 5

The USNWC and Salve Regina University, with support from the Foundation, partnered to host an event focused on the implications that climate change will have on national security organizations, activities, and locations. The Forum at Newport was conceived by Rhode Island Senator Sheldon Whitehouse and the 78th Secretary of the Navy, Carlos Del Toro. The evening's speaker, Lt Gen Richard E. Nugee, British Army (Ret.), presented "Why Should DoD Care About Climate Change?" He is the Non-Executive Director for Climate Change and Sustainability at the Ministry of Defence (MOD). During his speech, Lt Gen Nugee noted that members of the military are some of the best minds to tackle climate change based on their ability to adapt to situations and their strategic way of thinking. The second iteration of the forum was held in September 2024 at Salve Regina University.

China Undersea Warfare: Development Capabilities and Trends | April 11-13

The China Maritime Studies Institute held its annual conference in April 2023, welcoming 175 attendees - a mix of allies and partners and U.S. citizens. Panel topics included strategic and operational factors, submarine force hardware, submarine force human factors, ASW, seabed warfare, and challenges and countermeasures for the U.S. Navy.

Stockton Center for the Study of International Law's Alexander C. Cushing International Law Conference | May 23-25

The fifth iteration of the Alexander C. Cushing International Law Conference convened judge advocates, scholars, and practitioners from across the world to analyze international law and conflict at sea. The 2023 topic, "International Law: Conflict at Sea" was aligned with NATO's 2022 Strategic Concept, the 2022 National Defense Strategy and the 2022 National Security Strategy.



Alumni Connections

Regional Alumni Symposium

The USNWC held its 20th Regional Alumni Symposium (RAS) at the Chilean Academia de Guerra Naval, in Viña del Mar, Chile, from April 17 to 19, 2023. The event was the first outside the United States since the COVID-19 pandemic. It was co-sponsored by the Armada de Chile and welcomed nearly 100 participants representing 19 nations, including 14 flag officers and four heads of navies, coast guards or other national services. The three-day event included keynote addresses and panel discussions aimed to inspire collaboration and idea sharing. RAS are annual events co-hosted by the President of the USNWC and a regional partner navy. Participation is open to all international and U.S. graduates of the college.



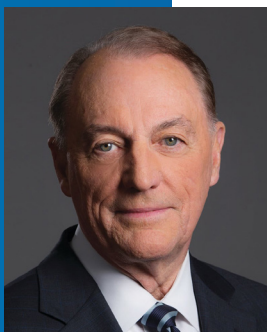

NEW ADDITIONS TO LEADERSHIP

Trustees



The Honorable Ronald K. Machtley

The Honorable Ronald K. Machtley was appointed to his first term on the Board in February 2023. Machtley was one of the longest-serving university presidents during his 24 years of leadership at Bryant University. He served three consecutive terms in the United States House of Representatives and was a member of the House Armed Services Committee and co-chair of the Military Educational Sub-Committee. He was the ranking Republican on the Small Business Committee's Minority Enterprise, Finance, and Urban Development Subcommittee. While in Congress, Machtley introduced the bill and initiative that enabled the USNWC to offer Master's Degrees. As a former participant in the College's war gaming, he understood the importance of the program. He spearheaded the effort to appropriate funds for the new wargaming facility and enhanced library. He served five years on active duty in the U.S. Navy as a Surface Line Officer and retired as a Captain from the U.S. Naval Reserves in 1995 after 25 years of service. Machtley is a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy and Suffolk University Law School.



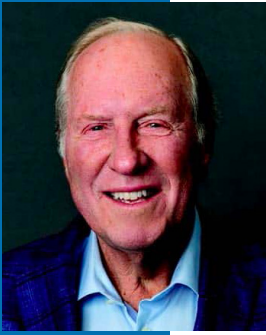
The Honorable Erik Bethel

The Honorable Erik Bethel is an accomplished global finance professional with over 25 years of experience. He currently serves on the leadership team at America's Frontier Fund, a non-profit enterprise committed to reinvigorating American innovation in sectors such as critical minerals, battery technologies, and semiconductors. Bethel is also a Senior Advisor at the Center for Strategic and International Studies and Senior Advisor at White Oak, a \$10Bn private credit firm. In 2020, Bethel was the U.S. Ambassador-Designate to the Republic of Panama. Prior to this, he was nominated by the President and confirmed unanimously by the Senate to represent the United States at the World Bank, where he played a pivotal role in the analysis and deployment of over \$100 billion of capital through grants, loans, equity investments, and other financial products. While at the World Bank, Bethel also spearheaded several technology initiatives, including artificial intelligence, blockchain, and the tokenization of World Bank loans. He was appointed to the Board of Trustees in November 2023.

He is currently a Fellow of Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge University. In addition to his career in public service, Lehman has written several books, including *Where are the Carriers? U.S. National Strategy and the Choices Ahead*; *Oceans Ventured*; *On Seas of Glory*; *Command of the Seas*; and *Making War*.

IN MEMORIAM

In 2023, the Naval War College Foundation (NWCF) lost four dedicated individuals who served the College and Foundation faithfully as members of our Board of Trustees.

Richard M. “Dick” Rosenberg *April 21, 1930 - March 3, 2023*

Richard “Dick” Rosenberg was a transformational leader as the former Chairman and CEO of the Bank of America. He was a patriot who served his country well. He was trained as an officer and served in Korea and Vietnam. Rosenberg was a member of the boards of directors of the Buck Institute for Research on Aging and the San Francisco Symphony. In addition, he was a faithful supporter of the NWCF and U.S. Naval War College (USNWC) throughout his life. Rosenberg served as a NWCF Trustee from 2004-2013, and as Trustee Emeritus until the time of his passing.

H. Dale Hemmerdinger *October 31, 1944 - April 20, 2023*

H. Dale Hemmerdinger was a visionary who propelled his family’s real estate business to become a leader in New York City and other prominent U.S. markets. He was a dedicated civic leader, including holding the position of Chairman at the Metropolitan Transportation Authority and guiding the organization through the 2008 recession. Additionally, Hemmerdinger was a dedicated philanthropist who served on the boards of New York University, the Museum of Jewish Heritage, the Nightingale-Bamford School, Harlem Academy, and the Naval War College Foundation. He served as a NWCF Trustee from 2011 to 2020 and was a Trustee Emeritus until the time of his passing.

CAPT Robert Turpin, USN (Ret.) *March 9, 1941 - September 7, 2023*

CAPT Robert Turpin, USN (Ret.), joined the U.S. Navy and attended Officer Candidate School in Newport, RI, after graduating from Coe College in Cedar Rapids, IA. He began his active service on the USS Galveston (CLG-3) in Japan and later spent three tours in the coastal waters of Vietnam during the Vietnam War. He continued his 31-year- Naval career in the Navy Reserve and was promoted to Captain in 1980, retiring in 1994. In addition to his Naval career, he worked in banking and investments before co-founding his own company, Turpin-Fischer Investment Advisors. Turpin served as a NWCF Trustee from 1993 to 2003, including as Chairman from 1998 to 200. He was a Chairman Emeritus until the time of his passing.

The Honorable Juliette Clagett McLennan *January 7, 1946 - November 15, 2023*

The Honorable Juliette Clagett McLennan was the first U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women under President George H.W. Bush. Under President Ronald Reagan, she was the manager of Blair House, which is used as the President’s guest house. While at Blair House, the Secret Service enlisted her as a member. At the USNWC, McLennan established the Honorable Juliette C. McLennan Essay Prize for Women, Peace, and Security. The prize is awarded each June. McLennan also provided significant funding to the USNWC’s Arctic Studies Program, including the Newport Arctic Scholars Initiative seminars. She was a NWCF Trustee from 2015 until the time of her passing, and served on various committees, including as Chairwoman of the Awards Committee.

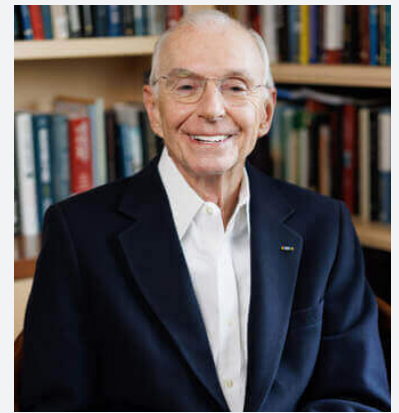
